Fowler Academy is a brand new facility, having recently opened in August 2013. It has five new rooms, three new offices, two new restroom facilities, a new kitchen/snack bar, new furnishings and carpeting, and new playground/athletic facilities.

#### School Safety Plan (School Year 2017-18)

On a small campus such as ours, teachers, office personnel, and the administrator all monitor students during breaks and at lunch. All classrooms have evacuation and other safety procedure charts mounted near the doors for quick reference. Lockdown procedures are also posted in each classroom. At Fowler Academy, we work closely with the district office in emergency situations and have an excellent relationship with local law enforcement personnel. We revise our school safety plan annually. This year, there were approximately 37 disciplinary incidents at Fowler Academy.

### Types of Services Funded (Fiscal Year 2016-17)

Our student assistance counselor has helped to implement several service learning projects with the students at Fowler Academy. Students have access to services from the district nurse, school psychologist, resource teacher, and district librarian as needed. The district librarian also helps provide an excellent library on campus.

Gifted and Talented Education (GATE): There are no students who qualify for GATE at Fowler Academy this year.

Special Education Program: Fowler Academy students enrolled in special education programs receive services daily from a qualified Resource Specialist Program teacher from the high school. Each student schedules time with this teacher during the week to review previously taught information, go over difficult concepts, and preview upcoming lessons prior to presentation by the regular classroom teacher. Special education staff members collaborate with the Fowler Academy teachers in regular meetings to meet the individual needs of the students.

English Learner Program: Our English teacher holds a Cross-cultural Language and Academic Development (CLAD) certificate and our math teacher recently completed CLAD. Although we have only two students who require English language development instruction, we use techniques developed for English learners to enhance the learning process for all students at Fowler Academy.

### Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

We use three staff training days before the school year to analyze state testing data, identify areas of need, and develop action plans. In 2013, we used an additional staff development day in October to work on curriculum and assessment, and our district psychologist trained the staff in crisis prevention. We offer training seminars throughout the year to our staff and faculty. Each month teachers meet in department-level groups to review student work, plan instruction, and review teaching strategies.
